How do we celebrate an event that for some was a bright day of opening up undreamed of opportunities and for others it was a dark day that marked the beginning of untold suffering for their people. Some who were persecuted for religious reasons found new freedom in America. Some who were suffering poverty and were lose to starvation found an opportunity for new life in America. On the other hand, more native Americans perished in the conquest of America than the number of Jews killed by the Nazis. For Native Americans it was a holocaust.



How could this happen among people who were not monsters

but the good neighbor, loving

family type of people? The economic opportunities of new land and the trade advantages were so great it blinded people to our collective sin of almost destroying one race and enslaving another. Now retrospect it is freely acknowledged that we committed a terrible crime against these people, but as a society we have never repented from hese deeds. We regret what happened but we do not repent. To repent is to turn from our evil ways, and this we have not done. We still pursue economic opportunities and trade advantages, and are oblivious to the death and suffering

we cause. There is no more cheap land but there are dictatorial world leaders clamoring to buy the latest weapons. We applaud the good paying jobs it brings us with hardly a thought at the death and suffering that will result. We applaud the trade advantage we can force on small countries.

How can we as disciples of the Prince of Peace celebrate event? We can hardly say there is nothing to celebrate. Maybe we can participate in some way. But it seems to me that the cry to repent from our death dealing economic pursuits must overshadow any call to celebrate. We cannot celebrate more of the same, but we can vision beyond repentance and see raised up out of the ashes of destruction a reconciled people of European settlers, Native Americans, Afican Americans, and Latin Americans. This we can celebrate, and the process in which this happens we can celebrate.


