Mennonite Voluntary Service was in the Lincoln Terrace Neighborhood for about 25 years. As we talk with people from the neighborhood we are made aware that this 25-year presence left a mark. Some people are very aware of the work that was accomplished. However, others never realized it existed. For all the good that was accomplished, this service did not produce a church in the community.

We are advised by some that we must focus on evangelism first. We agree the record shows, not only here but in many places, that service programs have not built churches. The record also shows that those who focused on evangelism

were more successful in church building. At Joy Mennonite we are not trying to evaluate voluntary service but rather we are seeking to discern the will of God for the future. We believe the choice is not between service and evangelism but how we do them that matters. If we do not understand the integration between two perhaps we don't understand either one. Sice should make people feel worthy and loved by God. The opposite is often the case; people feel unworthy when they need help. The preparation of our heart is as important for service as for evangelism. We must not assume

that we are naturally so good that our good deeds will attract people to God. But take heart, there was one who went before us. Jesus, who was known as a person of compassion, did make people feel worthy and loved. A heart conditioned by repentance, prayer and meditation and filled with a new spirit can make people feel worthy and loved.

As a way to begin what we believe we must do we have gone to the Neighborhood Association. We explained the closure of the Voluntary Service Unit. We suggested a new way to address community needs could be a volunteer day. We said we could help find and coordinate volunteers. They, who live in the neighborhood, must identify needs. Saturday, November 6, is to be our first volunteer day. We expect the vibrations of a new spirit to pulse through this neighborhood. If you feel a tug at your heart you may want to come and participate. We can guarantee a good and blessed experience.
