"We gather joy, pass it around..." This is the beginning of the chorus of the song I wrote for our church several years

ago. On the 20th of June, several members of our congregation gathered to share a little joy and a lot of good food with ten people who have suffered much, one group from Kenya, and one from here in Oklahoma City. Jan Jenner from Eastern Mennonite University was responsible for bringing the group from Kenva, who were victims of the U.S. Embassy bombing in Nairobi in 1998, to meet with victims of the 1995 Oklahoma City bombing. Susan Urbach was the local coordinator for the one-week visit to our city. A group from here will reciprocate with a trip to Kenya in July. As it turned out, our worship group felt that we were more on the receiving

end of the joy than the giving. Some people from our church who could not attend either sent food or donated money to purchase what was needed. Those who were fortunate enough to meet with our new brothers and sisters in Christ experienced an evening of fellowship and music that we will not soon forget. We were told that the members of the Kenyan groups liked to sing, and that Jan wanted to participate in a rousing Mennonite rendition of good old "Number 606." That was all the cue we needed, and we were blessed by several songs in Swahili by members of the group, and had a great time joining in when we could, with both the words and the

motions. Our benediction was the song, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

At one point, Melissa Workentine started singing a song in Swahili that she learned as a young child. The Kenyan group immediately recognized it and joined in. That was one of the highlights of the evening for me. I was also touched to see one of the Kenvan gentlemen reading to another, who had been blinded in the bombing. the church's welcome, and a poem I had written after the bombing here. Later in the evening, he asked to have it read again. It seems that sometimes when we try to give, we wind up also receiving joy, pressed down and running over.

Martha Shoemaker A Brief Biography By Thea Klassen

Martha was born on May 6, 1926 at Hess, Ok, at the home of her parents James and Lilly Morrison. They lived in a two-room shack. She was the third of twelve children. One brother died at two hours of age when Martha was 2. When her parents had six children, a man from a nearby church came and invited the family to come to church. Her

mother said they didn't have any clothes to wear. They were invited to church to receive some donated clothes. While there, a lady stated that her parents were drunks and bootleggers. Two women then took the clothes off the children

and said they would throw them into the trash because they weren't fit to give to another child. Martha asked her mother if she could go and get the clothes out of the trash but her mother said that that would be stealing. The people of
