We are entering the holiday season. This season is intended to help us focus on giving thanks for the blessings we enjoy and the meaning of the divine presence of God in our world as

revealed in the birth of Jesus. We find ourselves, however, more focused on the faltering economy and the war against terrorism. Given the experience of Sept. 11, the concern about terrorism is to be expected.

I am reminded of a discussion on non-violence in the refugee camp in Honduras between Honduran church leaders and the pastoral team at the refugee camp. One could see how naive one can be when we speak from safe positions. The refugee people had experienced terrorism firsthand. Here is what they said. When the seeds of injustice and violence are sown, the time comes when you know that if you do not defend yourself, you will die.

That is what happened to America on Sept. 11. The seeds of injustice and violence had ripened. Our eyes were opened and we realized that we were no longer safe. Our eyes were opened the possibility of weapons of mass destruction being used against us. As a nation, we were like a soldier, who meets an enemy face to face, the one who shoots first will live. The seeds have ripened, the reaping has begun. How can the teachings of our Lord about loving our enemy penetrate this kind of national consciousness that understands that we must now destroy the enemy or the enemy will destroy us? This consciousness penetrates into every corner of American life. It has penetrated our churches that pray for blessings on our guns and bombs and prays for our soldiers. It penetrates our homes where children miss their father greatly, but are made to see him as a hero on a mission to fight for their freedom. It penetrates our business world where everything sells better if you can stick a flag on it. We now believe we have no choice if we want to survive.

Jesus said this kind of world is to be expected. There will be wars and rumors of wars. Jesus also said, for faith and the faithful to survive in this world, you must watch and pray. In this context of a violent world, the question was asked, when the Son of God returns will He find faith on earth? Another way of saying it might be, when the Son of God returns will he find anyone proclaiming the word of God that brings reconciliation to the human family? Is there anyone who can see the world through the divine eyes of God?

In the wisdom of the world, our survival is the first concern.

In contrast, our Lord taught us that one cannot be a part of God's kingdom on earth unless you are willing to die. The nations of the world see the terrorists that threaten us. There are

many innocent people between the terrorist and us. Divine eyes see the innocent children made orphans. Divine eyes see women made widows. Divine eyes see the land of the poor bombed and infested with land mines that will kill innocent people for years to come.

I cannot stop the war. My immediate concern is, how do I keep myself from being sucked into this spirit of hatred and concern for survival. It can appear so right if looked at from one perspective and so wrong if seen from another. This is why we must urge each other, as our Lord did, to watch and pray. I know I am not alone, but I also know there are only a few, a remnant of those who wish to be found faithful when the Son of God returns.

We wish for all of you the presence of God's spirit, the joy of the Lord this season and in these times of national crisis, a sense of a people called apart.
