Since Sept. 11.2001 American people have adopted a patriotic frenzy. This patriotic frenzy has moved America to wage a war in Afghanistan against terrorism and is bringing us to the brink of war to overthrow the government of

Iraq. We cannot deny nor should we ignore the threat of terrorism in the world. We must also be aware how we may be nourishing the threat of terrorism. Provocative language by national leaders, support of unjust regimes against powerless people, and the hypocrisy of our nation is enraging many people and brings countless new recruits to terrorist organizations. In a few years our nation may be asking, how did we get to this place. The faith community must be asking that question now. I wish to quote from the words of Julius Ceasar, "patriotism is indeed a double edged sword. It emboldens the blood, just as it narrows the mind. And when the drums of war have reached a fever pitch and the blood boils with hate and the mind has closed, the leader will have no need in seizing the rights of the citizenry. Rather the citizenry, infused with fear and blinded by patriotism, will offer up all rights unto the leader and gladly so. How do I know? For this is what I have done, and I am Caesar." It should not surprise us that our nation would follow this course in the search for national security. Our concern is the way the faith community has abandoned the Lord and the search for reconciliation and justice for all people. Fear has overcome faith. Love has been surrendered for violence. Trust has shifted from God to our military might. We have traded bread for bombs. We have seen our people recite the pledge of allegiance with all the emotions and commitment that we expect in prayer. For God so loved the world has been replaced with God bless America.

We must prepare ourselves for difficult times. When policies do not work the most common solution is to devote more lives and more money to the failing policy. At a certain point nations become intolerant of any dissenting voice. The citizenry will turn against dissenting voices. Herman Goering, the great Nazi general said," people can always be brought to the bidding of the leaders. Tell them they are being attacked and denounce the pacifists for lack of patriotism."

I wish to encourage you to devote your selves to prayer, especially to pray for the faith community. May God give us wisdom and discernment for the facing of these days.

As our sale progressed, we told our customers how we hoped to help build a school, buy some wood to heat a hearth or help a mother buy her son or daughter a pair of shoes. We also told them about our Friday prayers for peace.

Then suddenly the same folks we'd sold things to appeared again. They carried their compassion for our cause in sacks and boxes of items for us to sell to make life better for families in Afghanistan.

"We'd like to help," they told us.

We made more money than we expected, and the money will be matched. We met old friends we hadn't seen for a while and made new ones, one of them a Native American woman looking for a Mennonite church.

It was much work, but joyful. We came away with the warm knowledge that all human beings are brothers and sisters and that if folks know about a need, they will pitch in and do what they can. "If we build it, they will come."
