At our last meeting for Afghan Relief, Michael, the son of Jewish holocaust survivors, met with us. As a child, Michael knew the experience of his parents was extremely painful. For

that reason, he did not talk to them about their experience. His parents, however, interpreted this as not being interested in their story. After Michael was married, and at the urging of his wife, he hesitantly asked his parents if he could write their story. With their consent and the help of a friend, they wrote the book titled, *Until We Meet Again*, by Michael Korenblit and Kathleen Janger.

Michael's father and a brother who fled to Russia were the only survivors in his family. Michael's mother thought she was the only survivor in her family until 37 years later, in his research to write the book, Michael discovered his mother's brother, one she had been very close to, had also survived. This brother also believed for 37 years that he was the only survivor. One can only imagine the initial shock and then the joy of being reunited.

Reading the book makes you feel the unbelievable brutality of the Nazis. This war and the urgency to stop such brutality are the classic justification for war. If reading the book stirs your emotions, can you imagine the emotions of writing such a book? Not only do you hear your parents' account of brutality; you interview countless people, most with horror stories. Yet, Michael says, "I did not come away from this experience with

hatred, rather a commitment to devote my life to prevent such an event from ever happening again, not by joining violent resistance, but an effort to stop hatred from sprouting and growing." This reminds me of the words of a Muslim in response to the bombing of the Murrah building in Oklahoma City. "We must work," he said "to prevent bitterness from growing out of this awful deed done to our city." Michael and his wife have devoted their lives to preventing hatred from sprouting and growing, mostly with children and youth. He says, "If you hate one person for one reason, you can hate anyone for any reason."

The magnitude of World War II has not been repeated since, but the brutality has been repeated many times in many places. After the war, there was Stalin and terrible brutality. Communist powers improved the science of revolution and control of the masses with brutality. The free world responded in kind. To brutally hurt those branded as the enemy seems to be considered normal behavior by all nations.

I have thought of this in regards to raising money for aid to refugees. Not that we must stop this effort. Jesus said that when you see the hungry and suffering and do nothing, for this you will be judged. Remember, our nation can make refugees and deplore their condition, and support your effort to alleviate their suffering, while they continue to create more refugees. Jesus also challenged the people of the Kingdom to be peacemakers. In Matthew, chapter five, Jesus concluded the profile of the Kingdom people with the challenge to be peacemakers, but warned: for this you will be persecuted. This is exactly how it is. If you do not join the hatred for your enemy, you will be hated.

Giving aid to the suffering seems to be easy part.

Peacemaking, the action that prevents hatred from escalating to a brutal war is hard. What can one do? One effort we made was urging people to pray and include prayer for your enemy. There are many good stories, but it is also true that even among people of faith, praying for your enemy is not understood to be normal. The puzzling part is that the more you openly declare that the Bible is the literal word of God, the more likely you are to turn to the brutal stories of the Old Testament to discern God's way and ignore the words of the God-sent One who asks you to pray for and-bless your enemy.

I am aware that I say these things, sheltered from violence, very naively. But there are those who have come through the fire, like Michael's family, and refuse to join the violence to prevent it from ever occurring again. Instead, they put their efforts into preventing the sprouting and growth of hatred. God bless them and all those who take the risks of being
