The Sunday after the beginning of the war in Iraq, the lectionary scriptures were the story of the Ten Commandments from the book of Exodus and the story of Jesus cleansing

the temple in the Gospel of John. The common thread between these scriptures passages is one of Israel finding its way and the other of Israel losing its way.

The ten commandments may be the best expression of a universal understanding of right and wrong ever written. Even the atheist who may not believe God exists can understand the terrible effects of humans who claim to be divine or claim to possess absolute understanding of the divine. The ten commandments may also be the most ancient understanding of the roots of war recorded. The first commandment reminds us that God is God and we are not. The second commandment warns us that we must not think that we can create with our hands anything that defines God. Anything we create with our hands or imagine in our hearts to declare to ourselves or the world that we have perfect and complete understanding of the divine is idolatrous. Is it not true that we regard ourselves as an enlightened generation, unlike the ancient peoples this document first addressed, yet September eleven is the result of one who claimed absolute understanding and a call from God to eliminate all those who do not share his understanding. This kind of idolatrous religious extremism is not confined to one religion, rather an amplified version of a common element in many religions, including religion in America.

The gospel of John tells the story of Jesus coming to the temple with great expectation. Jesus had deep concerns for those suffering under the Roman occupation and expected to find a ministry in the temple for these people. Instead of a spiritual ministry Jesus found a commercial enterprise set up in the temple. Spiritual leaders were enriching themselves by exploiting the poor. It was not as if some error had crept in, the religious community had completely lost their way. Jesus was not only disappointed, he was angry.

America today has a military power that cannot be challenged. Consequently we have lost the will to listen to others. With the certainty that we can win any battle we have lost the will to be reconciled. We want peace, we want security, we want to be safe, but we have lost the way. It is not surprising that a lone super power would follow this path for peace. The shocking news is, according to the pollsters, that the religious community in America is the drive behind the support of the war. According to the pollsters, opposition to the war comes from the secular community

Let me close with a quote from Gary G. Kohls printed in the

Catholic Peace Voice: The world has waited long enough to hear the authentic body of Christ stand up and say no to those who proclaim by their deeds the existence of a wrathful God, a pro violent Jesus and the justification of war."

The beauty of spring is upon us but dimmed by the suffering of war. I wish you all well. Let us not grow weary of doing good.

But they still, believing as they do, make this sacrifice, for the sake of freedom, for the sake of people they don't even know and even for the sake of those who not only don't appreciate it but openly despise them for it (I'm speaking of our own people).

I have a question. If the 'Good Samaritan' had come upon the man on the road as he was being robbed and beaten, and the Samaritan were to draw his sword and defend the man, would he no longer be the 'Good" Samaritan? Does God actually expect us (as individuals or as a nation) to ignore injustice as it happens, then send money later?
