After the terrorist attack on the world trade center our president declared, we will find and punish those responsible. To this our president added, those who are not with us shall

be considered to be against us and will also have to face the consequences. Our president expressed a wide spread trait of American people, we see one side of a situation and hold our opinions as absolute truth. It would seem that the fear from the terrorist attack has polarized our nation even more. We are not agreed on how to fight terrorism and divided over the ware in Iraq. When one reads the readers say section of our church periodicals one can see that this kind of divisive thinking is wide spread in our churches as well.. This is the kind of world Jesus was born into and the context in which Jesus taught about living in the kingdom of God. Jesus grew up among a people governed by a foreign occupation and deeply divided on how to deal with the painful conditions they were forced to live with.

People have asked me, what would you do if you faced a life threatening situation. If you are searching to know divine, eternal truth, what I would do is immaterial. I am not the center of truth. If, as the question implies, I am naive about the threat of violence in the world, that assumption is correct. I have lived most of my life in relative safety. But I must add, according to the testimony of some who experienced violence committed against them, safe times are also the best times to think seriously about a righteous response. The pain and anger that rise up in us from unjust treatment can paralyze us in that moment and prevent us from making good and right choices. In our experience in Central America we saw ordinary people take risks to do the right thing, risks as great as the risk of death. I have had doubts that I could take such a risk but I have come to believe that I could, but I know I must think about the way I must go now in the safe time, and I must do this with great humility.

After I have said this I confess I feel strongly about my view of war and violence and I believe it is right to hold issues of faith strongly, but I also understand that I must rise above the need to win as if our conversations were a debate. The need to win is that age old human desire to dominate others. When Jesus gave his disciples what he called a new commandment, that you should love one another as I have loved you, it was just such a situation as we face today, the need to be right, the need to win and the desire to dominate my brother or sister. We note that these words were given as a command, not good advice. This suggests to me that the kingdom people Jesus envisioned could not take root and grow without this kind of loving acceptance of each other being practiced in this new community

and that the desire to dominate and the lack of respect for the other was still present among his disciples. One can be passionate about faith and relationship to the Lord, and practice radical discipleship without feeling compelled to mould others to believe like me. This is what our Lord hoped for in the new community.

May God give us grace to be passionate without the desire to dominate and win.
